

The Rogue River Preserve lies within the ancestral lands of the Takelma and Latgawa peoples, who have lived on and cared for land in this region since time immemorial.

Located along the banks of the Rogue River in Jackson County, Oregon, the Preserve's 352 acres provide homes for at least 38 rare, declining, and uncommon plant and animal species across several distinct habitats.

In 2017, with significant help from the community, SOLC purchased the Preserve for the dual purpose of conservation and education, ensuring the land's permanent protection and opening the gates to learning experiences that inspire environmental literacy and stewardship.

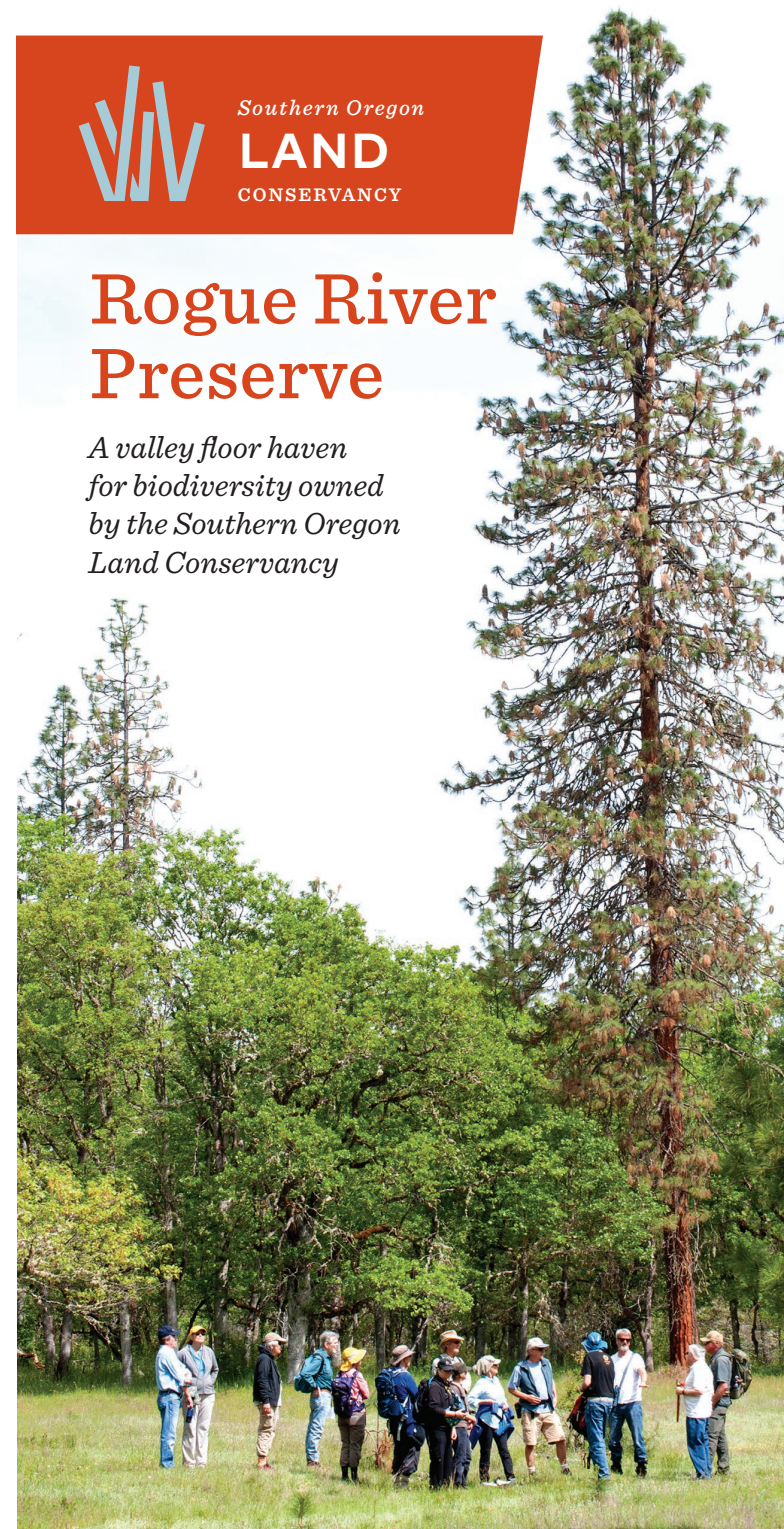

The rich mosaic of oak woodland, meadow, and chaparral supplies food and shelter for hundreds of animal species, including common kingsnake, Roosevelt elk, and Blue-gray Gnatcatcher.

Rare vernal pools and mounded prairie support a community of uniquely adapted plants, including the federally endangered large-flowered woolly meadowfoam.

Two miles of riverfront and a complex system of sloughs support habitat for spawning and juvenile coho and Chinook salmon, Western pond turtle, and Wood Duck.

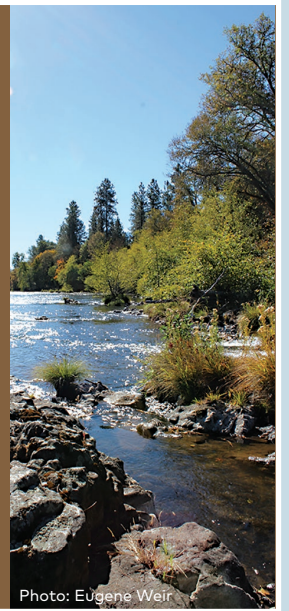
